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## **Welcome to Peterson Space Force Base**

Welcome to Peterson Space Force Base! We look forward to helping ease the transition to on and off base communities as well as area schools. If you're new to Peterson SFB, congratulations on your assignment and welcome.

Peterson SFB is a wonderful place for families. In addition to great amenities and recreational facilities found on and around the installation, our location offers unlimited points of interest in the surrounding communities and local schools committed to providing a quality education for our children. As your School Liaison Program manager (SLP), my role is to improve transitional support for school age children of Peterson SFB personnel by establishing partnerships between the base and local schools, advocating for military children, increasing awareness of the unique needs of military children, and providing a process to address and resolve military-specific issues affecting students in Kindergarten through 12th grade. We are very fortunate to have committed educators at all levels that are willing to help military families on a day-to-day basis. They appreciate our service to our nation and we appreciate their service to our children, our communities, and our nation as well.

There are many school systems serving Peterson SFB. Majority of base housing residents attend Colorado Springs School District 11 (D-11), Falcon School District 49 (D-49), and Harrison School District Two (D-2) and many others. Colorado is a "Choice State" and families have the option to apply to many quality schools within multiple school districts. Colorado Military Academy is a charter school located directly outside our north gate that is chartered under Charter School Institute (CSI) and will begin its seventh year this upcoming school year 2023-2024. Parents are encouraged to research and visit local schools as part of their Colorado School of Choice Application; a sample of local school performance may be viewed in Appendix A.

For those wishing an alternative to public education, there are also many quality private schools in the area from which you can choose (Page 38-40). Many families also choose to home school and there are many active home schooling groups you may choose to join in order to share talents and resources.



We have an excellent relationship with the local schools. Our commitment as a member of the surrounding school districts/communities is very strong—we will need your help to continue to expand this relationship to help improve our schools. Please consider volunteering in your children's schools or participating in Peterson SFB's Adopt-A-School Program.

There is a lot of information in this handbook that you will hopefully find helpful. It includes general information about registration, school physicals, immunizations, and information on graduation requirements. This is followed by listings of, and information about, local schools (both public and private) to include links to their websites, addresses, and phone numbers to the administrative offices.

## **General Information**

### **SCHOOL LIAISON (SL)**

The education and welfare of school-age children is a quality of life issue. Military families experience challenges with reciprocity and quality of education from location to location. School-age children are as transient as their military parents and may encounter transition and academic problems.

Every military installation has a School Liaison Program Manager(SLPM) to coordinate and assist parents of school-aged children with educational opportunities and information necessary to succeed in an academic environment. The School Liaison is the central point of contact for commanders, military families, and local school systems on school-related matters. Air Force School Liaisons network, educate, and work in partnership with local schools to address or enhance the military child's education. The Air Force School Liaison provides military commanders with support necessary to coordinate and advise military parents of school-aged children on educational issues and needs to assist in solving education related problems.

The SLP works to identify barriers to academic success and develop solutions; promote parental involvement in their children's education; develop and coordinate partnerships in education; provide



parents with the tools they need to overcome obstacles to education stemming from the military lifestyle; and promote and educate local communities and schools regarding the needs of military children.

The Air Force SLP also connects families with Child and Youth Programs (CYP), Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) and Family Support offices. Each branch of Service has SL's ready to serve relocating families, regardless of the service member's Service affiliation, ensuring a smooth transition to their new civilian schools. ### ***School Locator: "Colorado Choice State"***

The Colorado Department of Education recognizes that students may benefit from having a choice of schools to attend within the public school system that is not limited by school boundaries. As such, both in-district and out-of-district students may enroll in programs or schools within Colorado Springs School Districts on a space available basis.

To apply for admission to a school other than their residence school, parents are required to complete a "Choice" Open Enrollment application and submit the form to the school they wish to have their student attend. Annually, the open enrollment window for the next school year is as follows:

- Harrison School District 2; **Open Year Round**
- Widefield School District 3; 1 January - 23 February 2024
- Fountain Fort Carson District 8; 4 March – 15 May 2024
- Colorado Springs School District 11; 1 Nov 23 – 16 February 2024
- Cheyenne Mountain School District 12; available until April 2024
- Manitou Springs School District 14; **Open Year Round**
- Academy School District 20; 1 January – 15 March 2024
- Ellicott School District 22; - Opens 1 April - 1 Oct 2024
- Lewis Palmer School District 38; (first round) Beginning in January and closing 9 Feb 2024 (second round) 12 February - 20 September 2024
- School District 49; **Open Year Round**



\* \* Schools may accept applications after the open enrollment period on a space available basis, but not required to after the October student count day which is typically the first week of October.

Approved applications for choice open enrollment are valid up to the duration of the academic level (elementary, middle, or high school). Students must re-apply for "choice" open enrollment to attend a school other than their designated attendance area school at the next academic level.

State law further defines that applications may be denied only if (C.R.S. 22-36-101(3)) :

- There is a lack of space or teaching staff within a particular program or school requested
- The school requested does not offer appropriate programs or is not structured or equipped with the necessary facilities to meet special needs of the pupil
- The pupil does not meet the established eligibility criteria for participation in a particular program, including age requirements, course prerequisites, and required levels of performance
- The student is currently expelled or has been expelled in the preceding 12 months, or has been expelled as a habitually disruptive student or for a serious violation in a school building or on school property necessitating mandatory expulsion

Generally, district transportation is not provided for students attending a school under choice open enrollment, unless required by law. Transportation to and from school is the responsibility of the parent/guardian.

Students granted open enrollment at the high school level have the same curricular and extracurricular eligibility as all other students attending the school, subject to the rules and regulations of the District, Colorado High School Activities Association and state law.

### ***Military Interstate Children's Compact***

The Compact provides for the uniform treatment of military children transferring between school districts and states. It was developed by The Council of State Governments' National Center for Interstate Compacts, the Department of Defense, national associations, federal and state officials, and departments of education, school administrators and military families. Students Covered Under the Compact: Children of active duty members of the uniformed services, National Guard and Reserve on active duty orders, members or veterans who are medically discharged or retired for (1) year, or members who die on active duty are eligible for assistance under the Military Interstate Children's Compact and Uniformed members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration (NOAA) and United States Public Health Services. Students NOT Covered under the Compact: Children of inactive members of the National Guard and Reserves (Not Title 10), Members not retired, Veterans not covered, Other Department of Defense personnel, federal agency civilians and contract employees not defined as active duty & members other than uniformed personnel of NOAA and USPHS. Colorado is one of 50 states that have adopted the Compact.

### **Enrollment**

- **Educational Records** - the compact provides that schools must share records in a timely manner in order to expedite the proper enrollment and placement of students. If the sending school cannot provide the parent a copy of the official record, an unofficial copy will be provided that may be hand carried to the school in lieu of the official record. This unofficial record can then be used for preliminary placement while the school sends for the official record. Once requested, the sending school has 10 days to provide the official record to the receiving school.
- **Immunizations** – the compact provides for specific timelines, in this case 30 days from the date of enrollment, for students to obtain required immunizations in the receiving state.
- **Age of Enrollment/Course Continuation** – the compact requires, absent a new enrollment in Kindergarten, that a student shall be allowed to continue their enrollment at grade level in the receiving state commensurate with their grade level from the sending state. For example, if a student is enrolled and attends Kindergarten at the age of 5 in State A and transfers to State B, the student would be allowed to continue in Kindergarten despite State B's entrance age of 6 years. Further, the compact allows for such continuity of enrollment when a student has completed Kindergarten and is ready for enrollment in First Grade. For example, if a student has completed



Kindergarten in State A and transfers to State B, the student would be allowed to enter First Grade despite State B's entrance age of 6 or 7 years.

### **Eligibility**

- Power of Attorney - special power of attorney, relative to the guardianship of a child of a military family and executed under applicable law shall be sufficient for the purposes of enrollment and all other actions requiring parental participation and consent.
  - Tuition - a local education agency shall be prohibited from charging local tuition to a military child placed in the care of a non-custodial parent or other person standing in loco parentis who lives in a jurisdiction other than that of the custodial parent.
  - Non-custodial parents - a military child, placed in the care of a non-custodial parent or other person standing in loco parentis who lives in a jurisdiction other than that of the custodial parent, may continue to attend the school in which he/she was enrolled while residing with the custodial parent.
- Extracurricular activities - state and local education agencies shall facilitate the opportunity for military children's inclusion in extracurricular activities to the extent they are otherwise qualified.

### **Placement**

- Course placement / Educational Program placement - when the student transfers before or during the school year, the receiving state school shall initially honor placement of the student in educational courses based on the student's enrollment in the sending state school and/or educational assessments conducted at the school in the sending state if the courses are offered. Course placement includes but is not limited to Honors, International Baccalaureate, Advanced Placement, Vocational, Technical and Career Pathways courses. Continuing the student's academic program from the previous school and promoting placement in academically and career challenging courses should be paramount when considering placement. This does not preclude the school in the receiving state from performing subsequent evaluations to ensure appropriate placement and continued enrollment of the student in the course(s).
- Special Education services – 1) In compliance with the federal requirements of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 20 U.S.C.A. Section 1400 et seq, the receiving state shall initially provide comparable services to a student with disabilities based on his/her current Individualized Education Program (IEP); and 2) In compliance with the requirements of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act statutory the receiving state shall make reasonable accommodations and modifications to address the needs of incoming students with disabilities, subject to an existing 504 or Title II Plan, to provide the student with equal access to



education. This does not preclude the school in the receiving state from performing subsequent evaluations to ensure appropriate placement of the student.

- Placement flexibility – local education agency administrative officials shall have flexibility in waiving course/program prerequisites, or other preconditions for placement in courses/programs offered under the jurisdiction of the local education agency.
- Absence as related to deployment activities – a student whose parent or legal guardian is an active duty member of the uniformed services, as defined by the compact, and has been called to duty for, is on leave from, or immediately returned from deployment to a combat zone or combat support posting, shall be granted additional excused absences at the discretion of the local education agency superintendent to visit with his or her parent or legal guardian prior to leave or deployment of the parent or guardian.

### **Graduation**

- Waiver requirements – local education agency administrative officials shall waive specific courses required for graduation if similar course work has been satisfactorily completed in another local education agency or shall provide reasonable justification for denial. Should a waiver not be granted to a student who would qualify to graduate from the sending school, the local education agency shall provide an alternative means of acquiring required coursework so that graduation will occur on-time.
- Exit exams - states shall accept: 1) exit or end-of-course exams required for graduation from the sending state; 2) national norm-referenced achievement tests or 3) alternative testing, in lieu of testing requirements for graduation in the receiving state. Within 12 months of the effective date of this compact, the Interstate Commission shall adopt a rule addressing the acceptance of exit exams.

Transfers during Senior year – Should a military student transferring in his or her Senior year be ineligible to graduate from the receiving local education agency after all alternatives have been considered, the sending and receiving local education agencies shall ensure the receipt of a diploma from the sending local education agency, if the student meets the graduation requirements of the sending local education agency. In the event that one of the states in question is not a member of this compact, the member state shall use best efforts to facilitate the on-time graduation of the student.

## ***New Student Registrations and School Physical Forms***

New student registration for kindergarten through 12th grade takes place at your school. The district websites (Page 23) have information about enrolling your student, and enrollment forms that may be completed online, printed, and taken to the school. You may also access —School Finder on: <http://www.schoolchoiceforkids.org/english.php> to determine your neighborhood school, based upon your street address.

Only a parent or guardian may enroll a student in Colorado Springs School Districts. Along with a completed enrollment form for each student, you will need to bring:

1. Verification of child's birth date (birth certificate, passport, or military ID)
2. Immunization records
3. Proof of residency (current utility bill, lease, tax notice showing your name and the property address)
4. If student is not living with both biological parents, a copy of legal paperwork (custody/ guardianship) may be necessary
5. If student has an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) for special education services, a copy of the current/latest plan
6. Name and address of student's previous school to request academic records

Enrollment age requirements:

- CMA; children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 15
- D-2: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- James Irwin Charter: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before July 1
- D-3: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-8: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-11: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-12: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-14: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before September 1
- D-20: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-22: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-38: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before October 1
- D-49: children entering kindergarten must be 5 years old on or before August 15



## ***Immunizations***

**You must provide one of the following to your child's school in order to comply with the law:**

1. A completed Certificate of Immunization certifying that the student has received minimum immunizations as indicated by El Paso County Department of Public Health [www.elpasocountyhealth.org](http://www.elpasocountyhealth.org)

2. **Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children**

Student is given thirty (30) calendar days from the date of enrollment. For a series of immunizations, initial vaccinations must be obtained within thirty (30) calendar days.

3. If a student's Certificate of Immunization is not up to date, the parent/guardian or emancipated student has 14 days after direct notification to provide documentation that the next required immunization was administered and submit a written plan for completion of any additional required immunizations. If the plan is not completed, the student shall be expelled or suspended from school for non-compliance. Exception to this rule will be a shortage of a vaccine.
4. Statement of Exemption to Immunization Law printed on the reverse side of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Certificate of Immunization:
  - a) a **medical** exemption signed by licensed physician stating that the student's physical condition is such that immunizations would endanger life or health or is otherwise medically contraindicated; or
  - b) a **religious** exemption signed by the parent, guardian, or emancipated student that the student adheres to a religious belief opposed to immunizations; or
  - c) a **personal** exemption signed by the parent, guardian, or emancipated student that the student adheres to a personal belief opposed to immunizations.



## ***Bus Schedules/Fees:***

District 11 operates no fee school bus transportation from Peterson SFB to Christa McAuliffe Elementary, Jack Swigert, and Mitchell High School.

**District 2:** No fees for transportation to public schools within the district

**District 3:** No fees for transportation to public schools within the district

**District 8:** No fees for transportation to public schools within the district

**District 11:** No fees for transportation to public schools within the district

**District 12:** No public school transportation available; parent's responsibility to transport to and

from **District 14:** No fees for transportation to public schools within the district

### **District 20 Fees SY 23-24:**

Students who are eligible for transportation, but who ride infrequently, can call their students school and receive a free pass to ride with sibling or friend, or neighbor up to 3 times per semester. For more information, contact the Transportation Department, 719-234-1410.

#### **Students Exempt from Bus Fees**

The following students are exempt from paying fees:

- Special needs students who have transportation service designated as a part of their Individualized Education Plan (IEP), or
- English as a Second Language (ESL) students who attend their designated school and live outside the walk zone (1.5 miles for elementary students or 1.75 miles for secondary students). or
- Students who are eligible for free or reduced lunch and have completed the free and reduced lunch meal application.

Or you can purchase the following passes Unlimited Rides per semester:



In-District Neighborhood students:

- \$50.00 per student or \$200.00 per family

In-District "Choice" students:

- \$60.00 per student or \$240.00 per family

Out of District "Choice" students:

- \$70.00 per student or \$280.00 per family

**District 38 Fees:** Transportation office main phone number is 719-488-4711

There are three options for payment:

- \$.075 per student each way or \$1.50 per day
- A substantial discount can be realized by paying a \$230 flat fee for the entire school year in advance (\$1.20/day). To begin bus service, your student's account must have a minimum balance of \$75. A positive balance must be maintained in the student account. Negative account balances will result in suspension of bus riding privileges
- There is no charge for students who demonstrate they are eligible for free or reduced lunch

**District 49 Fees:** Transportation office main phone number is 719-495-1159

There are two options (tentatively) for payment:

- Annual Fee \$200/student or \$600/3+ students
- Quarterly Fee \$75/student no discount for multiple students
- Stand-by Punch Card \$25.00 for 10 rides

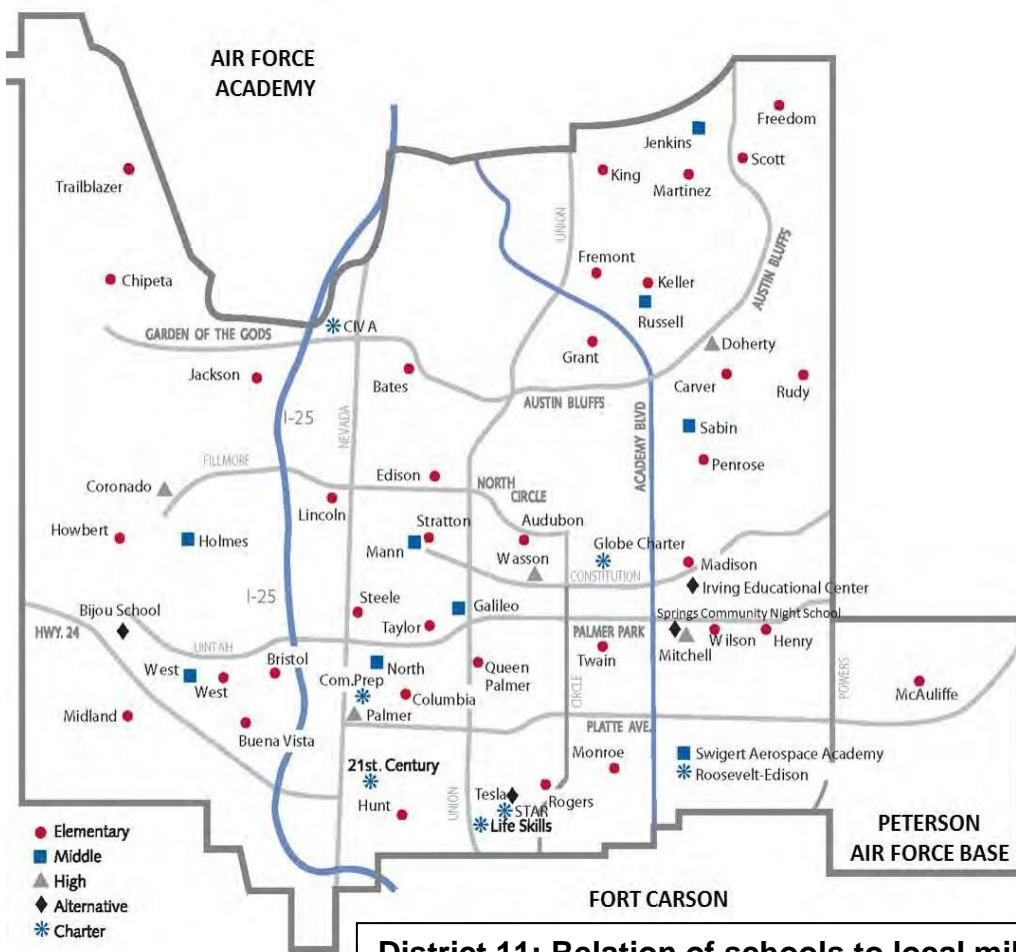
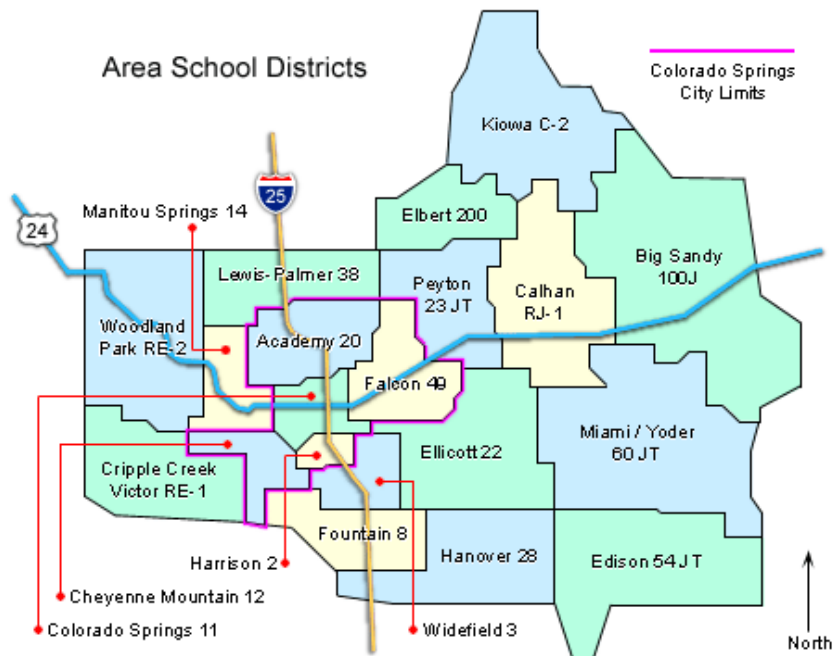

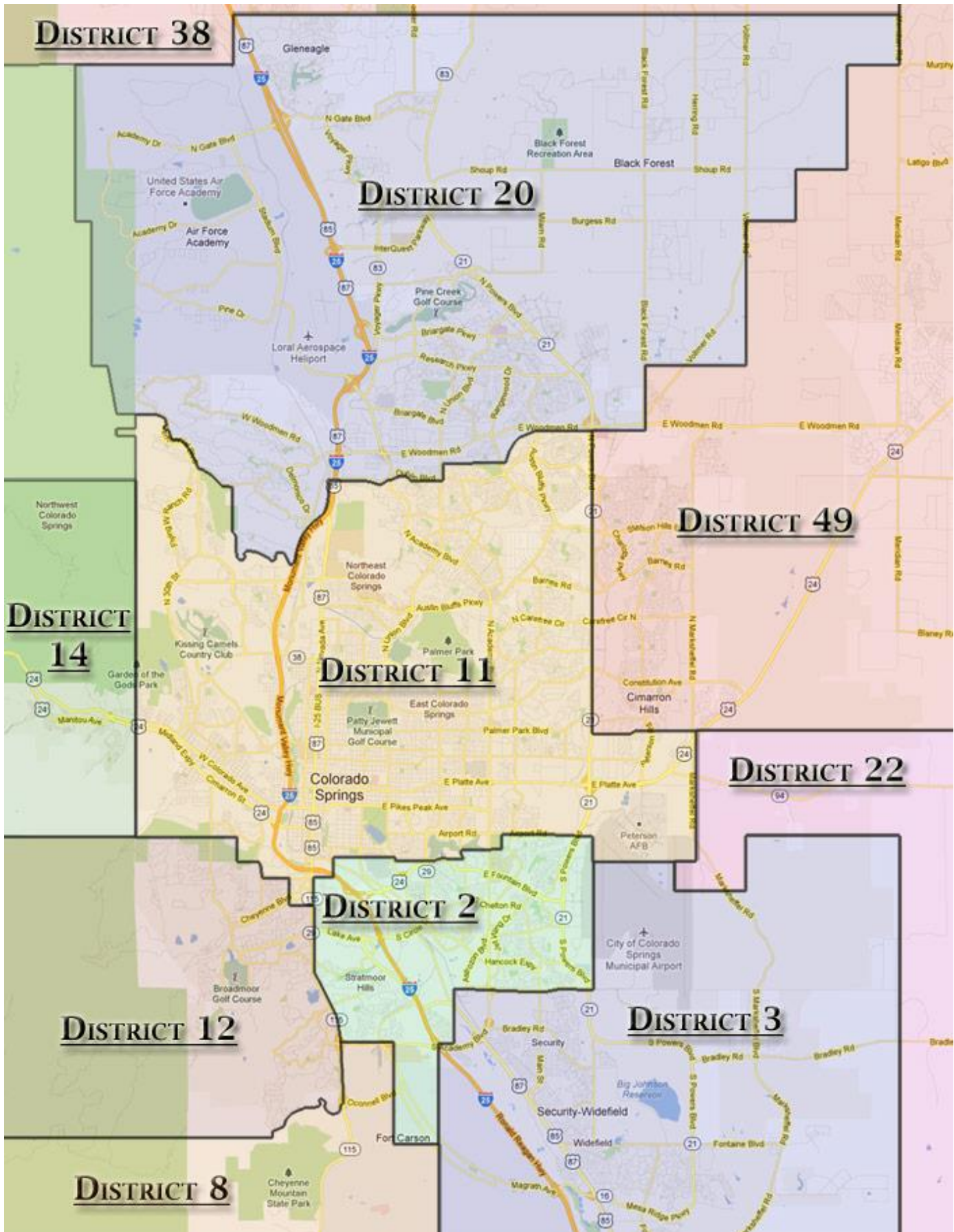
## ***Choosing a School***

One of the most important decisions parents make is to choose which school district their children will attend. Many factors go into this critical decision. Majority of families that live on Peterson SFB send their children to Colorado Springs School District 11, Harrison District 2, or the Colorado Military Academy. One of the largest school districts is Colorado Springs School District 11, consisting of 33 elementary schools (K-5), 9 middle schools (6-8), 4 high schools (9-12), 5 alternative schools, 9 alternative education programs, and 6 charter schools that serve more than 25,000+ students. Many families living off base may choose Harrison 2 (D-2) Widefield District 3 (D-3) Fountain-Fort Carson 8 (D-8) Cheyenne Mountain District 12 (D-12), Manitou Springs School District 14 (D-14), Academy District 20 (D-20), Lewis-Palmer District 38 (D-38) or Falcon School District (D-49). ## ***Colorado Academic Standards (CAS)***

The Colorado State Board of Education has adopted new learning standards for K-12 education to include the arts, mathematics, reading, writing, and communicating, social studies, world languages, science, personal finance literacy, comprehensive health and physical education, and STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics). The primary goal is to better prepare Colorado students for success in college and the workforce in a competitive global economy. These common core standards have been adopted by many states. The Office of Standards and Instructional Support (SIS) at the Colorado Department of Education define what all students in all Colorado public schools should understand and accomplish in the core areas as a result of their elementary and secondary schooling. The standards emphasize critical thinking, creativity, problem solving, collaboration and communication as essential skills for post-secondary and workforce readiness. Colorado requires the mandated use of the following assessments:

### ***Special Education***

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and Colorado's special education law require all schools to ensure that all identified children with disabilities have the right to a free, appropriate public education. ### ***Delayed Openings – Early Closure***

The school superintendents or designees can close schools, delay start times, or dismiss students early in the event of hazardous weather or other emergencies that threaten the safety, health, or welfare of students and staff members. The two primary factors in considering school closures are: amount of snow where drifting makes conditions unsafe for buses, and whether the wind chill is too cold for students to wait for a bus or walk to school. On days when school is cancelled or released early, all after school and evening activities are cancelled. Local television and radio stations will be informed by 5:30 a.m. that the starting time for the district will be delayed or that school is cancelled.



If school is delayed, the decision about whether to close will be made by 7:30 a.m. If the decision is to have school after a delayed start, there will be no further announcements. Delays are always 2-hour delays. Buses will run two hours later than normal and schools will start two hours later.

### ***Parent Teacher Association (PTA)/Parent Teacher Organization (PTO)***

You are encouraged to become active in your schools. Many schools have PTAs or PTOs; contact your child's school to determine time/location. If your school does not have a PTA/PTO, why not start one yourself? Schools are happy to have committed parents helping facilitate the education of children.

### ***Impact Aid***

The mission of the Impact Aid Program is to disburse Impact Aid payments to local educational agencies that are financially burdened by federal activities and to provide technical assistance and support services to staff and other interested parties. At the beginning of each school year, or at first quarter parent/teacher conferences, your child's school will send home a federal survey card to be completed by a parent or guardian. Please complete and return this form. Since 1950, Congress has provided financial assistance to local school districts through the Impact Aid Program. Impact Aid was designed to assist local school districts that have lost property tax revenue due to the presence of tax-exempt Federal property, or that have experienced increased expenditures due to the enrollment of federally connected children. It is **VERY** important for you to fill out these forms as they are tied to funding for your child's school. This is extremely critical in the current economic climate. Please fill out the forms and return them in a timely manner.



## ***Graduation Requirements***

Colorado Springs School District 11 graduation requirements are based on the number of units of credit earned in grades 9-12. A unit of credit is defined as the amount of credit given for successful completion of a unit of work as defined by the high school course handbook.

### **Subject Area Credits Required for Graduation beginning with the class of 2022:**

## Home Schooling

Home schooling is deregulated in the state of Colorado. Therefore, the parent or guardian is taking on all of the responsibility for the student's education including but not limited to; the acquisition of books, supplies, tests, and maintaining permanent records.

- Your program shall include no less than 172 days of instruction, averaging four instructional contact hours per day. (22-33-104.5(3) (c), C.R.S.)
- Your program shall include, but is not limited to: communication skills of reading, writing and speaking, mathematics, history, civics, literature, science and regular courses of instruction in the constitution of the United States. (22-33-104.5(3) (d), C.R.S.)

### State Requirements:

- The parent or guardian must provide written notification explaining the intent to home school his or her child. Notification can be given to any [Colorado public school district office](#).
- This written notification must be given 14 days before the parent or guardian establishes the home school program. (22-33-104.5(3) (e), C.R.S.)
- The notification must list the child's name, age, place of residence, and attendance hours.

Please Note: Written notification must be re-submitted to the school district each year the home school program is maintained after the initial year.

If the written notification is not submitted to the school district the student resides in, the residing school district must be notified as well to avoid truancy action.

This score helps us understand whether their growth is low, typical or high compared to their academic peers.



For example, a student with a growth percentile of 78 performed at or better than 78 percent of his or her academic peers and can be said to have high growth.





## COLORADO'S GROWTH MODEL

For the past decade, Colorado has been a national leader in how to measure a student's academic growth from year to year. About 10 years ago, the state created the Colorado Growth Model to look specifically at how individual students progress from year to year based on the state standards. It provides another dimension of performance beyond just achievement on tests by describing the relative growth of individual students from year to year. The model provides information for many different student populations and identifies areas of strength and areas that may need more attention and support. It also supplies necessary growth data for the annual school and district accountability ratings.

### HOW DOES IT WORK?

A student's score is matched with his or her "academic peers" or students in the same grade who have had similar score histories on the Colorado Measures of Academic Success tests in English language arts and math. Scores are also calculated using the same methodology based on the growth from the PSAT to the SAT. For example, a student who scored 357 on his third-grade math assessment in 2017 and 400 on the fourth-grade test in 2018 would be grouped with other students who had similar scoring histories to determine his fifth-grade growth score.

Growth is not expressed as a test score but rather a **student growth percentile**, which has some similarities to how pediatricians use height and weight percentiles in discussions with parents. In the doctor's office, a child in the 60<sup>th</sup> percentile for weight is as heavy as or heavier than 60 percent of children his age.

A student growth percentile looks specifically at growth on specific tests. So a child who scores in the 60<sup>th</sup> percentile grew academically as well or better than 60 percent of his or her academic peers on those tests.



## **WHAT IS CONSIDERED LOW GROWTH, TYPICAL GROWTH OR HIGH GROWTH?**

As defined by the Colorado State Board of Education, a child who falls below the 35 percentile for growth is considered to have made low growth. Typical growth is between the 36<sup>th</sup> and 65<sup>th</sup> percentile. The state median growth percentile is 50 for each grade and subject. High growth is above the 65<sup>th</sup> percentile.

### **Examples:**

- Low growth: A child with a growth percentile of 20 indicates that 80 percent of this student's academic peers had at least the same or better growth on this particular assessment.
- Typical growth: A child with a growth percentile of 55 mean as he or she grew at the same rate or better than 55percent of his or her academic peers.
- High growth: A child in the 80<sup>th</sup> percentile grew as well or better than 80 percent of his or her academic peers.

Note: The "low," "typical" and "high" categories don't tell us if the growth was sufficient for the student to be at grade level. Rather, it tells us how much they grew in their academic achievement from year to year compared to other similar students.

# ARRIVAL



## GETTING HERE

Directions from airport: The Colorado Springs Airport is south of Peterson SFB. Following the road exiting the airport, turn right on Powers Boulevard. Stay on Powers for about 6 miles. Turn right at the Airport Road inter-section. This is the access road to the Peterson SFB West Gate. If you wish to enter Peterson SFB through the North Gate, stay on Powers Boulevard until you reach Platte Avenue, U.S. Highway 24. Exit right; the exit for the North Gate is about 1 mile east of Powers Boulevard.

Directions if driving: If entering Colorado Springs on Interstate 25 from south or north, exit on Academy Boulevard. Proceed toward the center of the city, turn east on Platte Avenue, U.S. Highway 24. The Peterson SFB North Gate will be on the right, about 1 mile east of Powers Boulevard. If coming from the east on Highway 24, the Peterson SFB North Gate will be on your left, on the eastern edge of Colorado Springs.

## SPONSOR INFORMATION

Your sponsor can help make your arrival and in processing procedure smooth. Talk with your sponsor about your needs and ask for assistance with transportation, maps and base procedures. The Air Force established the sponsor program to make reassignment easier. Your sponsor has experienced the relocation you are about to make and has answers to many of your questions. If you don't hear from your sponsor within 60 days of your reporting date, call your new unit's orderly room. The Visitors Center is a good place to meet sponsors. It is at the West Gate on Stewart Avenue.

### **IDENTIFICATION CARDS**

Identification card applications for Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System- eligible people and civilian contractors are issued at the Military Personnel Section customer service center in Building 350. For more information, call 719-556-0008.

### **VEHICLE INFORMATION**

**Temporary License Plates:** Personnel with temporary license plates can't register their vehicle until they receive permanent tags; however, they are still required to maintain proof of current vehicle registration, insurance and valid military or civilian employee identification.

**Automobile Titles:** To title your vehicle, you must show proof of insurance and proof of purchase with sales tax paid in a previous state or you will be subject to Colorado sales tax. You will be assessed state tax of 3 percent, plus county and city tax at your home address. City and county tax varies and can amount to as much as an additional 1.5 percent of the purchase price. The total sales tax can be as high as 7.5 percent. If you purchased a vehicle over-seas within the last six months, it is subject to Colorado sales tax when registered. All others are exempt.

**Insurance:** Vehicle insurance coverage is mandatory in Colorado. It must be verified at the time of vehicle registration. The mandatory liability minimum in Colorado is \$25,000 bodily injury, \$50,000 per accident and \$15,000 property damage.

**Driving Regulations:** The speed limit on Peterson SFB is 30 mph unless posted otherwise. In the family housing areas, the limit is 15 mph. Base regulations require the use of seat belts at all times while riding in a car. **Restraints:** The operator of a motor vehicle is responsible for ensuring that all individuals in the vehicle properly use appropriate restraint devices while the vehicle is in motion. All adults will wear a seat belt and all children will be properly secured in a child safety seat or adapted seat belt configuration, as appropriate, and as stated below. All children are required to be properly restrained on and off base.

#### **Four Steps for Life:**

**Step 1 —** Rear-facing child seats for children from birth to at least 1 year old and at least 20 pounds (keep child rear-facing for as long as possible).

**Step 2 —** Forward-facing child seat for children more than 20 pounds and 1 year old to at least 40 pounds and 4 years old.

**Step 3 —** Belt-positioning booster seats for children from more than 40 pounds and 4 years to about 80 pounds and 4 feet 9 inches. If the child cannot sit all the way back in the seat and still bend his or her knees, then he or she needs a booster seat.

**Step 4 —** Seat belts for older children large enough to fit correctly. Children younger than 12 years of age should not sit in a position where there is an air bag unless it has been deactivated; it is recommended that children 12 and younger ride in a



back seat. Also, effective Aug. 1, 2010, all children 8 years old or younger must be restrained in a booster seat (new Colorado law).

### **DRIVING ON PETERSON SFB**

To operate a vehicle on Peterson SFB, drivers must comply with AFI 31-218, AFMAN 31-116 and any local supplements. Drivers must have proof of ownership or registration, a valid driver's license and proof of current vehicle insurance with at least minimum liability limits in accordance with any applicable laws. Drivers cited for not having proof of insurance must bring proof to the security forces squadron, Building 626, Suite 1253, within 24 hours, or the next duty day. Failure to do so can result in a suspension of their base driving privileges. Additionally, drivers may not use a cellphone while operating a motor vehicle unless using a voice-activated hands-free device. The operator may not wear any form of portable head-phones, earphones or other listening device while operating a motor vehicle on base except for a hands-free telephone headset or a single ear bud piece. Also, restraints are required for all occupants of vehicles being driven on Peterson SFB. Finally, the use of speed detection devices is prohibited on Peterson SFB.

The U.S. Air Force Traffic Safety Program requires operators of Motorcycle, ATV and Three-Wheeled vehicle riders to wear head protection, eye protection, protective clothing, and foot protection. Wearing of long-sleeved shirt or jacket, long trousers and full-fingered gloves or mittens is required. The gloves or mittens must be made from leather or other abrasion-resistant material. Sturdy over-the-ankle footwear that affords protection for the feet and ankles is required. See AFI 91-201 for specific requirements. All military personnel, on or off a DOD installation, and all DOD civilian personnel, on or off a DOD installation, in a duty status who operate a motorcycle on a roadway are required to attend and complete an approved motorcycle rider education course. Contractors and family members are encouraged, but not required, to attend a Motorcycle Safety Foundation course.

### **FIREARMS REGISTRATION**

People living in base dormitories or temporary lodging facilities must register and store privately owned weapons in the armory in Building 1376. You can check out your weapons temporarily, but they must be returned for storage within 72 hours unless you're going on temporary duty or have written permission from the first sergeant or commander. Base housing residents may keep their privately owned weapons in their quarters but must register them at the armory (719-556-7066). Concealed weapons permits issued by civil authorities are not valid on Peterson SFB without written approval from the 21st Space Wing commander. Don't transport weapons on Peterson SFB unless driving directly to and from the security forces armory for storage or your residence in base family housing. Advise the gate guards if you have a weapon and where you intend to take it. Weapons must be unloaded and transported in a vehicle's trunk, or in the cab of a truck. Don't leave weapons unattended at any time. They must be under the control of a person 18 years old or older.

### **GIANT VOICE SYSTEM**

In addition to broadcasting Reveille and Retreat, the Giant Voice system plays a critical role in notifying base members of severe weather warnings and operational notifications such as force protection condition changes. For example, if a tornado is spotted in Colorado Springs, a tornado siren warning would be a steady three- to five-minute tone. If an announcement for "lockdown" is heard, seek shelter and lock all doors to your location. There is a weekly base siren system test every Friday at noon. An announcement is made prior to, and immediately after the test, informing base personnel to disregard the sirens.



## CUSTOMS AND COURTESIES

On Peterson, reveille plays at 7 a.m., followed by "To the Colors." Retreat, followed by the national anthem, sounds at 5 p.m. and taps plays nightly at 10 p.m. Reveille and retreat, respectively, signal the beginning and end of the official duty day while "Taps" signifies lights out or the beginning of quiet hours.

Regardless of whether they are in uniform, Airmen are required to stop and turn toward the flag at the first sound of reveille or retreat and stand at the position of parade rest. In the event the flag is not visible, they should turn toward the general direction of the music. Those in uniform should come to the position of attention and render a salute when they see the flag being raised or lowered or at the first note of "To the Colors" or the national anthem. Those not in uniform may salute but at a minimum should come to attention and stand with their right hand over their heart. If not saluting, men wearing a hat should remove it with their right hand and hold it at their left shoulder with their right hand over their heart. In accordance with 21st SW policy, these courtesies should be held until "To the Colors" or the national anthem has finished playing or until the flag has been completely raised or lowered. Airmen wearing the Air Force's physical training uniform should render the same courtesies appropriate when wearing other Air Force uniforms. Vehicle operators also have a role to play in rendering respect during reveille and retreat. Anyone driving a vehicle on base should come to a complete stop at the first note of "To the Colors" or the national anthem and put their car or motorcycle in park. Everyone inside the vehicle should remain quietly seated.

While formal protocol procedures are not required during the normal playing of "Taps," if it is played at a military funeral or memorial honors ceremony it is a different matter. Service members attending these events should render a salute upon hearing the first note of "Taps" and should hold their salute until the last note is played. Anyone not in uniform should come to the position of attention and place their right hand over their heart. As with reveille or retreat, men wearing a hat should remove it with their right hand and hold it at their left shoulder with their right hand over their heart.

## INCLEMENT WEATHER PROCEDURES

To meet mission requirements and still take the best possible care of people during inclement weather, delayed reporting, early release and base closure procedures are in place for all military and civilian people assigned to Peterson.

For purposes of reporting during inclement weather, base members will be designated as either essential or nonessential. Everyone should check with their supervisor to see which category applies to them.

**Essential:** The minimum number of people needed to keep critical operations functioning until additional support arrives. These people include, but are not limited to, firefighters, security forces, command and control, snow removal, medical personnel, dining facility workers, designated child care workers and shift workers.

**Nonessential:** People who could be delayed for short periods of time (hours to days) without serious mission impact.

**Notification:** The Peterson Snow Information line 719-556-SNOW (7669) will be updated by 5:30 a.m. inclement weather decisions will also be relayed to selected radio and television stations for broadcast, and via social media. To receive text alerts directly to your phone sign up by texting "follow @PSFBAlert" to 40404.

**Delayed Reporting:** This authorizes non-essential members' additional time to safely report to work. The 21st SW commander initiates delayed reporting when off-base driving conditions require additional time to arrive safely and gives on-base snow removal teams time to prepare the base for normal activity following a major winter storm.

People should not arrive earlier than the delayed reporting time to minimize interference with snow removal operations.

Base housing residents should consider walking to work to minimize traffic on streets and in the parking lots.



Delayed reporting is based on normal duty hours, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and is mandatory for nonessential members to comply.

**Phased Early Release:** Nonessential people may depart their duty location at a specified time before the end of the duty day. Phased early-release notification will be passed through unit commanders and will be completed in 30-minute intervals.

The 30-minute interval reduces traffic congestion leaving the base and helps ensure everyone makes it home safely. Based on mission requirements, supervisors should use their judgment in deviating from the phased early-release plan.

**Base Closure:** This means only essential personnel must report to duty (or remain on duty) if weather is severe enough to prevent replacements from safely reporting.

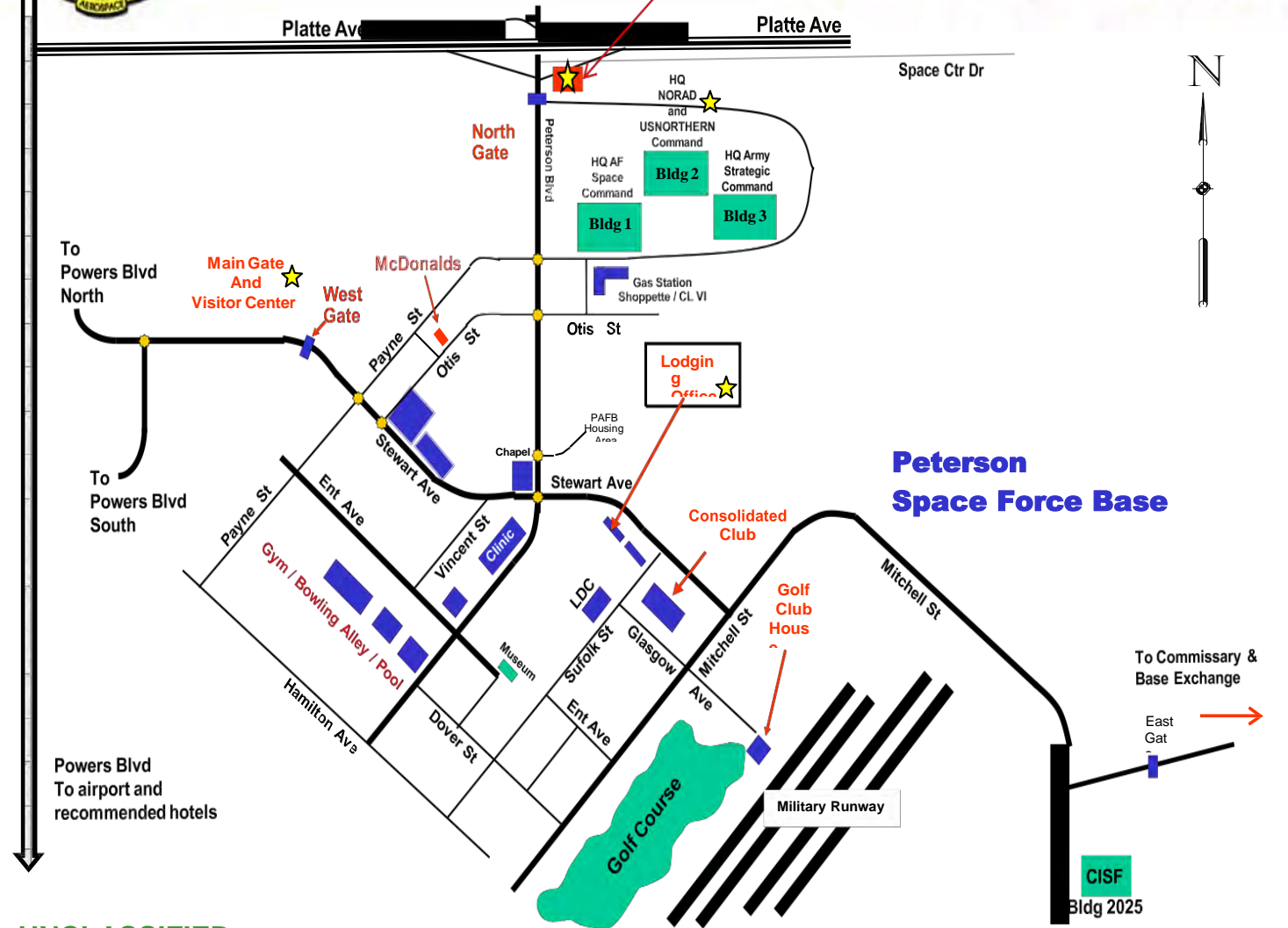

## Colorado Springs Area Information



### **A GOOD NEIGHBOR**

The Peterson community extends beyond the gates. It travels throughout our surrounding strong communities and permeates the fabrics of our neighborhoods. Peterson members pride themselves as strong supporters of the community they share their lives with and strive to promote citizenship through example. Military installations account for about 20 percent of employment in the Colorado Springs community, and community outreach is an opportunity to display Peterson AFB's camaraderie with its citizen neighbors.

### **COLORADO SPRINGS SCHOOL DISTRICTS**

The 21st SW is a proud partner with School District 11. Wing member's support classes with volunteers for school events — science fairs, career days, tours, guest lecturers and mentors. ### **LOCAL INSTALLATIONS**

Colorado Springs' reputation as a prime location for important military installations got its start in the 1940s when Fort Carson was established on 137,000 acres a few miles south of the city.

### **FORT CARSON**

Fort Carson is south of Colorado Springs in the shadow of Cheyenne Mountain. About 26,000 active-duty Soldiers and 5,800 civilians are stationed at "The Mountain Post."

The major units assigned to the post include an infantry division, a training division, a Special Forces group and an area support group. Many other smaller units also call Fort Carson home.

Airmen are often referred to Evans Army Community Hospital in Building 7500 on Titus Boulevard. The five-story medical complex has a 76-bed capacity. The two-story clinic building contains 400 examination and treatment rooms. A common area connects the clinic building and the main hospital. This area includes the main entrance, medical library, chapel and pharmacy.

Fort Carson is proud of its 18-hole championship golf course, Cheyenne Shadows golf course, Thunder Alley Bowling Center, Mountain Post Sports Complex, Outdoor Recreation Complex, and auto and woodworking shops.





### **AIR FORCE ACADEMY**

The military's presence expanded with the Air Force Academy in the 1950s. It occupies more than 18,000 acres of land just northwest of Colorado Springs. More than 4,000 cadets attend the academy. More than 1,000 men and women enter the academy each year to begin a four-year program that leads to a commission in the Air Force.

The Air Force Academy is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Colorado. Nearly 1 million people visit the facility each year. People also come to see the Air Force Falcons compete in Mountain West Conference athletic events. For ticket information, call 719-472-1895.

### **SCHRIEVER SPACE FORCE BASE**

Schriever Space Force Base, about 10 miles east of Peterson SFB, was established in the mid-1980s. There are more than 6,200 personnel working on the base. It is home to the Air Force's 50th Space Wing, a component of AFSPC. The 50th Space Wing provides integrated combat effects from space, ensures command and control of satellite weapons systems, and conducts expeditionary operations. The 50th SW operates and supports more than 150 satellites and satellite programs like the GPS, Space-based Space Surveillance and the worldwide Air Force Satellite Control Network. Also at Schriever is the Space Innovation and Development Center, the Missile Defense Agency and the 310th Space Wing, the Air Force Reserve's only space wing.

### **COLORADO SPRINGS**

Colorado Springs is situated at the junction of what was the inspiration for the song "America the Beautiful." To the east are rolling plains. To the west rises the majestic 14,115-foot Pikes Peak, one of many high, scenic peaks of the Rockies. To the south is the Arkansas River valley with its agricultural lands and the town of Pueblo. To the north lies the Denver metropolitan area.



Much of Colorado Springs occupies gently rolling hills which slope westward, offering unobstructed views of Pikes Peak and the mountains of the Colorado Front Range. From the very beginning, Colorado Springs and the Pikes Peak region have been developed as a community with quality of life in mind. Today, they offer citizens a blend of business opportunities, culture and unparalleled out-door recreation.

## **HISTORY**

Colorado Springs began as one man's dream. When Gen. William Jackson Palmer first saw the scenic attraction of the Pikes Peak region, he immediately knew it was a location that could attract his wealthy European and East Coast friends. The city's first stake was driven in 1871. Colorado Springs became especially popular with the British and acquired the nick-name Little London. Riding the rails, visitors came to see the area's beauty and were inspired to stay by a mild climate and the region's growing resort accommodations.

In the 1890s, Colorado Springs found it was surrounded by more than scenic wealth. Gold was discovered in nearby Cripple Creek in 1891, and Colorado Springs found itself a thriving financial center. The golden years lasted until 1917, when the United States went to silver for its coinage, and the local economy once again emphasized tourism. Looking to expand its economic base, the city offered land to the military in 1942. With the start of World War II, Fort Carson was established to the south of Colorado Springs. Peterson was originally known as the Colorado Springs Army Air Base. That name was changed to Peterson Army Air Base in December 1942 in honor of Lt. Edward Peterson, who lost his life in the first fatal crash at the installation.

The military's presence grew in the 1950s with the opening of USAFA. The construction of Cheyenne Mountain AFS and Falcon Air Force Base, now named Schriever SFB, helped create the reputation of Colorado Springs as the nation's military space capital. Third only to Florida and Texas, Colorado is well-entrenched in the space community. Manufacturing expanded tremendously when the area's quality of life and cost advantages were recognized in the 1960s and 1970s. Today, computers, electronic equipment, semiconductors, precision parts, plastics, heavy equipment and countless other high-quality products are manufactured in the Pikes Peak region and shipped to national and international markets.

The amateur sports segment is one of several service industries expanding in the region. Colorado Springs is home to the headquarters of the U.S. Olympic Committee and Olympic Training Center, the world's finest multisport training facility.

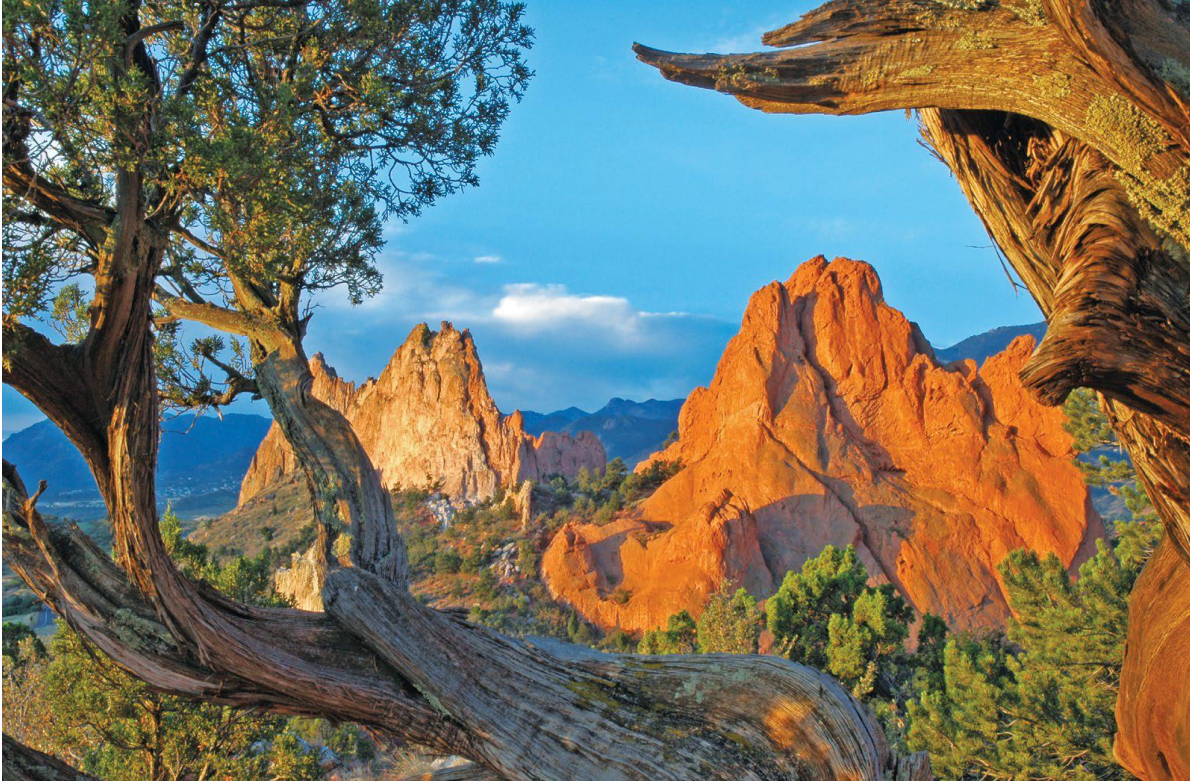
## **CLIMATE**

Colorado Springs' pleasant climate is a key element in the area's high quality of life. Weather in the Pikes Peak region is surprisingly mild; uncomfortable extremes are rare. Despite a moderately high-altitude site near the Rocky Mountains, Colorado Springs on average gets less snow than Denver, Salt Lake City or Minneapolis. The mountains capture most of the precipitation from east-moving systems, giving the Pikes Peak region dry and sunny weather most of the year. However, the weather can change dramatically in a matter of hours. At an elevation of 6,035 feet, residents enjoy a number of climatic advantages. Long and lingering Indian summer autumns are common, while spring is a mild precursor to summer. Colorado Springs' meteorological classification is an alpine desert with about 250 days of sunshine and only 15 to 16 inches of precipitation per year. Humidity remains comfortably low.

While snow is not uncommon, it doesn't remain on the ground long. Sunny days are abundant during the winter, and the sun's intensity at this elevation quickly melts snow from streets and sidewalks. Warm chinook winds also help moderate the winter climate. These dry, northwesterly winds can cause rapid increases in temperatures, reminding



residents that the Native American meaning of chinook is “snow-eater.” Mild, sunny weather in the middle of the winter is typical, allowing residents to golf, bike, hike, play tennis and enjoy all types of outdoor activities in the sunshine. However, as little as a 30-minute drive into the mountains can reveal temperatures 15 degrees colder than in the city.



## Local Communities

Nearby communities offer many attractions — from professional sports in Denver to the colleges and universities in Pueblo and Colorado Springs, to the hiking trails and mountains in the area.

### DENVER

Denver, the state capital, is about an hour’s drive north of Colorado Springs on Interstate 25. It is a center for music, art, education, sports, outdoor recreation and entertainment in Colorado. Denver supports professional basketball, football, baseball and soccer teams. The Denver Art Museum, Denver Botanic Gardens, Children’s Museum, Museum of Nature & Science, Gates Planetarium, Denver Mint, governor’s mansion, and the National Western Stock Show are other attractions. ### FOUNTAIN VALLEY

Fountain Valley includes the communities of Fountain, Widefield and Security. These communities are about 10 miles south of Colorado Springs and 30 miles north of Pueblo along Interstate 25. ## **PUEBLO**

Pueblo, about 45 miles south of Colorado Springs on Interstate 25, offers the Pueblo Symphony Orchestra, the Sangre de Cristo Arts and Conference Center and the Pueblo Art Guild Gallery. Pueblo is also home to the Colorado State Fair. Top national entertainers, a rodeo and a military appreciation day are highlights of the event, which attracts about half a million visitors each year. ## **SPORTS, RECREATION AND PARKS**

## **RECREATIONAL AREAS**

Colorado Springs has one of the most extensive municipal and regional park systems in the nation, with more than 8,000 acres of park area. Major public-use facilities can be found in nearly every neighborhood. Regional parks, typically more than 100 acres



in size, offer beautiful scenic views. The Garden of the Gods Park, North Slope Recreation Area, Palmer Park and North Cheyenne Canyon offer diverse sights and recreational activities. ### **GARDEN OF THE GODS**

### **TRAILS FOR HIKING AND BIKING**

A growing network of urban and rural trails makes many scenic areas in the Pikes Peak region more accessible to hikers and bicyclists. Hiking and walking opportunities abound in nearby city, county and state parks. Barr Trail, which ascends the east side of Pikes Peak from Manitou Springs, is among several local hikes in nearby national forest service land. The area’s growing ranks of mountain bikers have discovered and developed hundreds of miles of enjoyable trails for all skill levels.

### **FISHING, RAFTING AND OTHER WATER SPORTS**

Reservoirs, natural lakes, rivers and streams, many in developed state parks or national forest lands, provide a vast opportunity of water-related recreation. Anglers are treated to “Gold Medal” trout streams, reservoirs laden with native and stocked rainbow, cutthroat and brown trout, and ample warm-water fisheries stocked with walleye, bass and catfish — all within a few hours’ drive. Mountain anglers are treated to some of the West’s best ice fishing for trout, pike and landlocked salmon.

Whitewater rafting season, May through July along several freestone rivers, is noted as being some of the best in the nation. Water skiing, inner tubing and power boating are available on many lakes in the area. These lakes are balanced with others that have boating restrictions to allow those who prefer canoes, kayaks and small boats to enjoy quieter water.

### **SPECTATOR SPORTS**

The Pikes Peak region is a sports fan’s heaven. Local competitions and exhibitions abound, such as world-class athletics at the Olympic Training Center, authentic rodeo, professional golfing, auto racing and countless other sports events. Colorado Springs is home to Vibes baseball at Security Services Field, built in 1988, seats up to 10,200 fans for 72 home games each season. Rodeo competitions have a large following in the Pikes Peak region. Two major rodeos take place in Colorado Springs in July. The Pikes Peak or Bust Rodeo and the National Little Britches Rodeo are held here each summer. Many smaller rodeos are held in other communities in the Pikes Peak region yearly. The Colorado Springs area is a haven for sightseers. 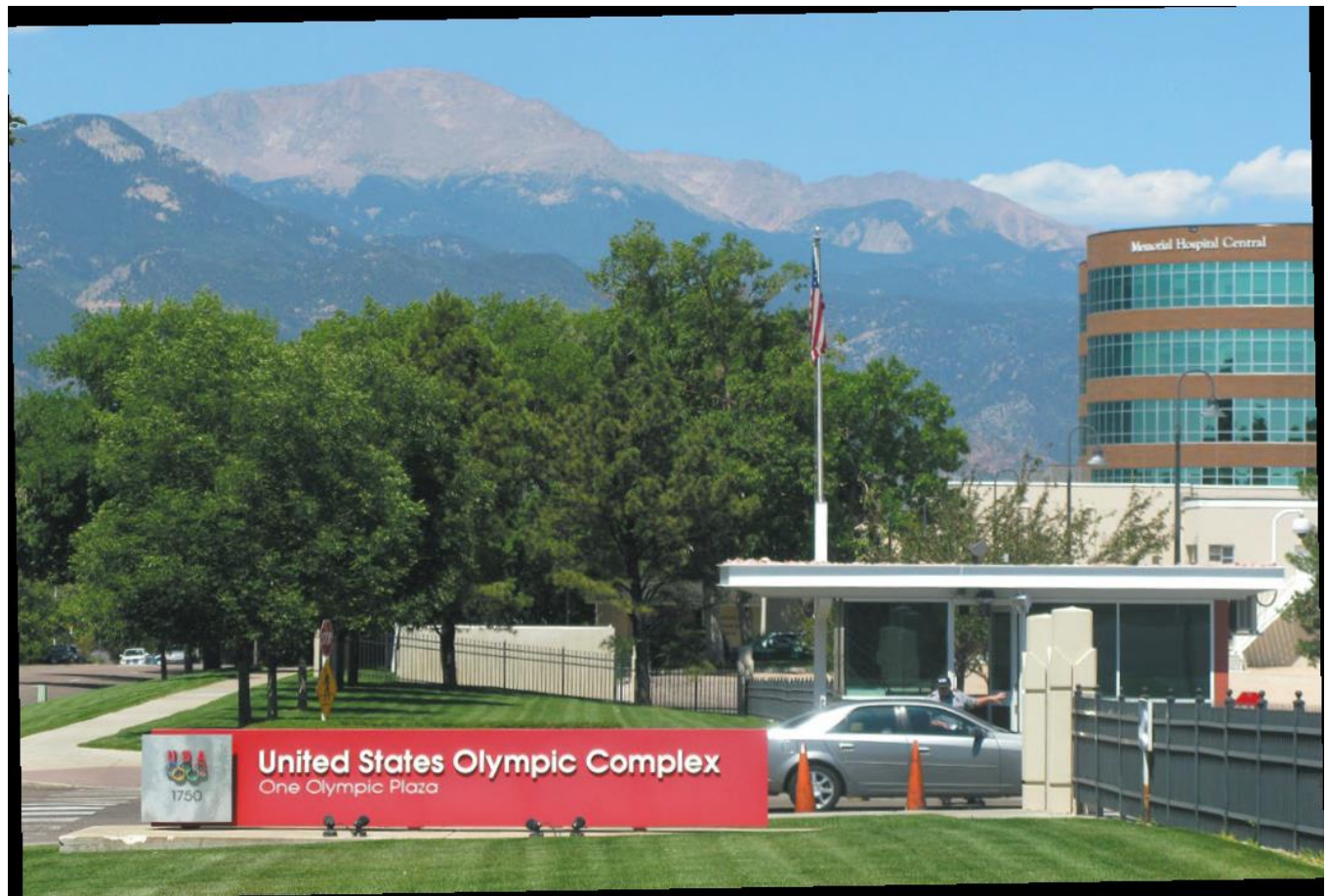
##### **NATIONAL PARK AND PRESERVE**

View the "Grandest Mile of Scenery in Colorado." Seven Falls is only 10 minutes from downtown Colorado Springs. The fall 2013 flooding damaged this site, but it is open once again.
